Ash Wednesday Service—March 2 at 7:00 PM

Lent is a season of fasting, but we want to make sure our fasting is true and right (see Isaiah 58). As such, our Ash Wednesday will have three occasions where we may come before the altar. First, we may come to receive the ashes for we are sinners, the sin is the penalty for death, and that sin led the Son of God to the Cross. It will be a time for somber reflection.

Then, we may come forward to partake of Holy Communion where we remember that the penalty for our sin has been paid, there is a remedy, and we are called to receive that gift.

Lastly, we may come to receive anointing. Ash Wednesday marks the start of a penitential time in the life of the Church, but we are going to fulfill Jesus' command in Matthew 6:16-18. We are not going to show the world a disfigured face. We are going forth under the anointing of God, showing forth the glow of His Holy Spirit, and allow the joy of the Lord to be our guide and fulfillment even while we commit to fast and pray.

At the beginning of the year, we looked at spiritual gifts. Now is the time to put those gifts to work. In fact, it is the perfect time as we move into the season of Lent. After all, Lent is a season of preparation. As such, we should be preparing to serve the Lord by putting to good use the spiritual gifts He gives us by the Holy Spirit.

Mostly, when people think of Lent, they think of not doing certain things or eliminating certain things from their lives. However, there is an active component to Lent as well that I want you to consider this year.

What I am talking about is similar to love for instance. When I made a vow to my wife, I eliminated every other woman from my life. Because I love her, I have said, "No," to many activities and paths for my life. On the positive and more active side, because of my love for her, I have said, "Yes" to many things that would not have been a part of my life without her, and I have done and pursued many things with her as part of our marriage and family life.

When some people think of Christianity, all they can think of is the negative. As Christians, we refrain from many activities that the worldly indulge in. Many people can only hear, "Thou shalt not!" ring in their ears when they hear the voice of God, but that is only half the story. Indeed, following Christ means saying "No" to a lot of things, even ourselves (**Luke 9:23**)!

Unfortunately, too many Christians carry that same attitude. When it comes to Lent, they think of the things they need to omit from their lives to think of their love for God. When they commit to a Lenten discipline, they may give up chocolate or choose to fast for a day or two during the week from food. They may choose an electronic fast—no

computer, no phone, no social media—for the season.

While those pursuits are noble and may lead to spiritual growth, they often impact the individual primarily and have little impact on the community. Don't get me wrong, I have practiced many spiritual disciplines of omission in my walk, and they are worthwhile, in their place, but I believe God is calling us in a different direction this year.

As we enter the season of Lent, I want to pursue a spiritual discipline, but I want it to be a discipline of com-

mission where you do something, and primarily do it for someone else. Think of serving someone or commit to performing an act of random kindness each day.

Years ago, a young lady in a church I served listened to me when I put out a simi-

lar plea. She was a high school student and spoke about serving others with her mother. Soon, Grace was talking to me about committing a weekly outreach to residents at a local care facility. I told her that I wished her and her mother well, but she told me that she wanted the church to be a part of this—me included.

That year, every Monday, we drove out into the countryside to serve people who had little money, little family, and little hope. We sang with them, we shared devotional time, we did crafts with them, and we sat down and had snacks with them. When we first arrived, many of the residents were skeptical of our intentions. When they saw that we just wanted to share our love of Christ with them and spend time with them no matter how they responded to us, there was a joy and camaraderie that grew in that gathering.



**Let your light so shine before men,
that they may see your good works, and

When Lent ended and Easter began, we looked at what began as a youthful Christian's dream. The church members all agreed that we could not say our task was completed because the 40 days (plus Sundays) of Lent had passed. We committed to returning on a monthly basis. In the days ahead, we saw God soften hearts and change lives.

For instance, there was one guy, who had been left at this facility by his family due to his alcoholism. Around Thanksgiving one year, this man was quite despondent. He and I sat in a corner, ate cake, drank coffee, and he poured out his heart to me. He told me how his family refused to come get him for the holiday, but he understood why after all the ones he ruined by drinking too much and behaving in all sorts of inappropriate ways.

He wanted to go, and he claimed that he had changed. I encouraged him to contact them again and tell them that he had changed as he heard the Word of God in a new way recently and accepted it. I told him that I would support him, and he could have them contact me.

He never called. When we returned a month later, he was beaming. He told me that he did what I had asked. He went to his sister's house. He refrained from drinking. He demonstrated that something had changed in him and that he could be a good brother, a good son, and a good uncle. Everything went so well that he was invited to come back at Christmas. That was the reason his face shone when I greeted him that December day.

Thinking about that man and that conversation still warms my heart. God used me to share His love with someone who thought he was a lost cause. Somehow, he found a new purpose and a new way to relate to his family. He realized that his worth couldn't be found in a bottle but in the Lord.

None of it would have happened except that a teenaged girl listened and was obedient. From that sprang a new

ministry in a church, and that ministry took on a life of its own and impacted many people in the church and that facility.

That is my hope for St. John's this year, and that is my hope for you. I pray that you find joy in service—in giving back to the Lord by serving His people as the Holy Spirit guides. I pray that you invite friends and members of this church to serve alongside side of you. Most of all, I pray that you see how your service can directly impact the life of another human being.


I want you to know the joy of being a light to the world. I pray that you shine brightly with the light of Christ, and I pray that others see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven just as Jesus commanded (**Matthew 5:16**).

My brother, my sister, commit to being the hands of Jesus' that greets a child of God this Lent.





There are times when it seems that the Ohio Winter never ends. These days we have the comfort of modern heating and insulated homes, but back at the beginnings of Hardin County things were quite different. When our founders of St. John's arrived in 1837 this was truly a frontier area. The following story might be titled the "Great Escape" but it is better known as the first escape from a jail in Hardin County. This tale is excerpted from the Centennial History of Hardin County, Ohio, written in 1933 by Herbert T. O. Blue.

"An interesting incident occurred in 1837 when the first jail-escape was effected by a prisoner whose name was Halstead. He had been arrested on the northern part of the county for stealing a horse. After being imprisoned, Halstead was placed in charge of William McGovern, Deputy Sheriff. The weather was very cold, and the jail having no fireplace or stove, a huge iron kettle was improvised as a heating apparatus by being filled with blocks of wood and a fire started, the smoke escaping as best it could. Soon after his arrest, the prisoner complained of an intense thirst, and asked the Deputy to supply him with plenty of water. He also professed a religious turn of mind and requested McGovern to furnish him with a supply of candles, so that he might read his Bible after nightfall. The Deputy Sheriff readily granted all the prisoner's requests.

However, one morning when McGovern visited the jail, he was greatly astonished to discover that "the bird had flown". The prisoner had taken the blocks of burning wood from the kettle, and by constant toil had burned a hole through the log floor near the wall of the jail, and having tunneled under the wall made good his escape. It had required many nights of labor to do the work. The prisoner had used the water, which the unsuspecting deputy had left him for drinking purposes, to put out the fire when daylight would compel him to forego his labors. During the day Halstead was careful to see his bed was placed over the scene of his work. The prisoner even stole his bedding to protect him from the cold, and his escape was a standing joke on the deputy sheriff for many years to come."

The penalties for horse stealing in those days ranged from 39 lashes to the back well laid on, to branding, to hanging. In context remember that horses were extremely valuable in sustaining a farm and existence. We can only hope that perhaps his prison "conversion" to a more Biblical life was successful at some point. Halstead was never seen heard of again in the County. Remember to count our many blessings for being here now and having our Church family.
