

The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." ⁴² Again, for the second time, He went away and prayed, "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, Your will be done." ⁴³ And again He came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. ⁴⁴ So, leaving them again, He went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words again. ⁴⁵ Then He came to the disciples and said to them, "Sleep and take your rest later on. See, the hour is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. ⁴⁶ Rise, let us be going; see, My betrayer is at hand."

Sermon	The Eye of the Beholder

When Jesus died on the Cross, those who witnessed His death and its manner looked upon Him as an object of derision. Beaten and bloodied, gasping for breath, He quoted from the **22nd Psalm** and cried out, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" Seemingly separated from God, this Man who claimed to be the Anointed One, fell into what appeared to be the abandonment of God.

But what do you see? Do you only see Jesus as glorious on Easter Sunday and at His Ascension later on? Do you see, even on the Cross, that Jesus is glorious and beautiful? What the world calls tragic is the place where God's wondrous work takes place.

Even though the results of brutal power and taken aggression were clearly seen in the body of Jesus, those powers are impotent. Apart from the story of Christ, many of those in power would have long been forgotten. However, Jesus' name lives on. Why? Because, through loving service and self-sacrifice, He defeated those who would have dominion over Him and over you and me. By taking into Himself the sin and death that is our judgment, He broke their bonds. At His death, curtain in the Temple was rent asunder (Mark 15:38), and Spirit of God was soon to be poured out upon humanity. At the same time, we were enabled to draw near the throne of grace with confidence (**Hebrews 4:16**). By the blood sacrifice of Christ, we can now enter into the presence of God.

Now, we, like the centurion standing by the Cross, can behold something much differently than what the world sees. Now, we can proclaim even in the midst of pain and suffering and tragedy, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" (Mark 15:39)
