I often wonder what the disciples were doing between the Day of Christ's Resurrection and Pentecost. From the snippets of their lives that we see in scripture, we know they waffled a bit. After the Resurrection, some of them went back to work fishing. They figured it was over, so why continue following a dream. In acts, with the disciples on the Emmaus Road, we see they were struggling to reconcile the Old Testament, Jesus' teachings, and their current circumstances. Even after seeing the risen Jesus, they struggled to fully comprehend the impact of it all.

We'll discuss this some more in the sermon May 14th, but I want you to wrestle with this too. What were the disciples doing during the period between Jesus' Ascension

(Acts 1:11-12) and Pentecost (Acts 2:1-2) (a period of 10 days)? We know from scripture they were in Jerusalem as instructed in an Upper Room. However, what were they doing?

I believe they were rehearsing all they had heard during Jesus' ministry, then the events of His last days, His Crucifixion, His Resurrection, and His Ascension. Then, I believe they came to a very real and genuine place. They recognized how, compared to God's holiness, they fell far short and were unrighteous in and of themselves. They were not ready to


lead the Church. They were sinners. No longer were they pointing at how they were greater than the next guy as they did with Jesus in that Upper Room.

They were confessing and repenting. They were doing this to themselves. They were doing this to one another. They realized they were not worthy of God's grace, but they also recognized their calling from God. They were opening their hearts for Pentecost—they were preparing themselves to receive the Holy Spirit. They were humble AND faithful!!!

As I often point out, when I prepare the preaching calen-

dar, I often believe God is leading in a certain direction, but when the time comes to actually preach those sermons, He is leading us in a new direction. Sometimes, it is something God lays on my heart. Sometimes, our circumstances have changed. Sometimes, the Holy Spirit intervenes and says, "This is the Word for God's people here and now!!!"

When God first laid these passages and outlines on my heart, I had no idea that I would be battling cancer and facing my mortality. I never thought that this year could be the year when I cease to be your pastor or simply cease to be upon this earth. Then, the diagnosis came, and my world has been upside down ever since.



Now, when I preach about you, the members of St. John's Evangelical Church, maturing in your faith, it's not simply about taking a step forward in faith as I had envisioned months ago. Then, I was thinking I can see the church maturing and ripening and 2023 would be a good year to focus on bearing fruit for God's kingdom. I could see the church praying together and growing in faith as you discipled one another one-on-one and in small groups. I could see renewed interest in ministry and service in our community. I even envisioned evangelism in the streets of Kenton where members of our church went into the community, shared the Gospel, and

brought people into a meaningful relationship with Christ and active membership in our church. Then, I saw the church growing spiritually AND numerically and repeating the process again and again.

Of course, in all that, I saw myself at the helm of the ship and guiding the course of the congregation. Now, that may not be my mission and ministry. Now, the vision of 2023 being a step in the right direction may need to be a necessity for the future viability of our congregation. Instead of being at the helm, I may have to watch all this develop at a distance. Now, we all need to trust in the Holy Spirit, be led by the Holy Spirit, and have absolute faith in Christ.

The story of the disciples in the Upper Room between the Ascension and the day of Pentecost is our story. Now is the time for each and every one of us to discern what God is doing in our lives here. We need to wrestle with God's calling upon our lives and our commitment to living that out. We need to look at our lives and see where we have fallen short. We need to

confess and repent—to ourselves and to one another. And then, we need to commit to open our hearts to our heavenly Father and remain in a position of openness.

One day soon, God is going to pour out His Holy Spirit upon His people here. When that day comes, we need to receive, and we need to rise up like the disciples and proclaim the Good News. We need to go into the streets of this town and minister. We need to transform lives. We need to impact one another, and we need to impact our community. We need to realize that we CAN do all these things in the name of Jesus Christ. We are capable. You are capable—with me or without me.

I pray that our impending separation will be short and temporary. I pray that I will return soon. Whether I return or not is irrelevant to the work that God desires to do in this place through His people—YOU, YOU, YOU—in the

this place. Just as 2,000 years ago, God's desire is that His people—all His people—rise up and minister in His name as a priesthood of all believers.



You know the Good News. You are saved by the grace of Jesus Christ. You know the love of the Father. The Holy Spirit dwells in you. Now is the time to allow the gifts of God to grow and flourish in you so they overflow as a blessing to one another in this church and into this community and into the world.

Twelve Disciples did that 2,000 years ago, and they changed the world. Imagine what a few of you can do to enhance the trajectory of St. John's Evangelical Church, Kenton, and beyond!!! I have a vision of it. I hope you see it too. Even more, I hope we give ourselves to God's vision of the future. Whatever we imagine it to be, His is more glorious than ours ever could be!

Most of all, I want you minister with grace and power to one another in this church and to the world around us!!!

Mission of the Month— Bryan & Katie Crabtree—Thailand

Bryan and Katie, both of Northwest Ohio, each came to personally know Jesus Christ as savior in their teen years. Bryan previously attended St. John's and helped with the youth group. After they met, Katie joined Bryan in attending St. John's where they would eventually marry before moving to their first home in Bellefontaine. Now they are missionaries in Thailand.

The Lord has laid it on their hearts to share this hope that they've found with those that have yet to hear. In Thailand, Katie teaches a Christian curriculum to her first grade students who primarily come from Buddhist families. Bryan is laying the groundwork needed to see a church planted in this unreached area. Both are engaged in learning the Thai language to connect with more and more people. The Crabtrees have 2 beautiful, lively daughters- Elli & Ava (with another child on the way).

Pastor Randall's favorite scripture is in the end times discourse in Matthew 25: Verse 40 "And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these My brothers, you did it to Me." As a church, St. John's has been so blessed by God over the 184 years of its existence. Looking back at our records of giving gives us a challenge to meet going forward. It all started with our theological father Martin Luther. Martin Luther's Top Ten Quotes about Ministry among People in Poverty:

10 "According to this passage [Matthew 25:41-46] we are bound to each other in such a way that no one may forsake the other in his distress but is obliged to assist and help him as he himself would like to be helped."

-Whether One May Flee from a Deadly Plague (1527)

- 9 "Christians are to be taught that the one who sees a needy person and passes by, yet gives money for indulgences, does not buy papal indulgences but God's wrath." -Ninety-five Theses (1517), #45
- 8 "Let us also be generous [as Abraham was], and let us open the door to poor brethren and receive them with a joyful countenance. If we are deceived now and then, well and good. In spite of this our good will is demonstrated to God, and the kind act...is not lost on Christ, in whose name we are generous. Hence just as we should not intentionally and knowingly support the idleness of slothful people, so, when we have been deceived, we should not give up this eagerness to do good to others." -Lecture on Genesis, Chapter 18
