

Feel, but I'm too proud to open up and ask ya To pick me up and pull me out this hole I'm trapped in

The truth is, I need help, but I just can't imagine who

Who I'd be if I was happy

embrace the being in the Valley of the Shadow of Death knowing that the rod and the staff of the Good Shepherd are protecting me [**Psalm 23:4**].

I am reminded how blessed I am for no other reason than I have a faith and trust in Christ and Christ alone [see **Jeremiah 17:7-8** in the quote box above]. Right after Jeremiah speaks of the blessings of trusting of God, the subsequent reminds us that the heart is deceitful and sick above all else. Following our heart can lead us far and astray from God.

"How can I be happy when others suffer so much?" we ask, or "How can I be happy when I suffer [or lack something]?" Some of you have had personal struggles this year. Others carry a concern for family members, friends, and others. Some amongst us struggle to feel joy when others are not as blessed as they are. I know a part of me has survivors guilt, which is when a person's guilt derives from being delivered from something when someone else was not.

God has always been good to me, and I still believe that. When I falter, He delivers a word to my heart. As I struggled with some of the issues I illuminated in the previous paragraphs, the Holy Spirit prompted me to read an old quote from Thomas Watson. "If God be our God, He will give us peace in trouble. When there is a storm without, He will make peace within. The world can create trouble in peace, but God can create peace in trouble."

Every now and then, God will awaken me in the night. I


In our Fallen nature, the heart falls prey to all sorts of ungodly passions. It distorts reality. It craves the validation of others, except for the One who truly loves it unconditionally, purely, and wholly. Even when we "know better," we still succumb to the deceptions of our own hearts as we compare ourselves to people and things that do not deserve our comparison.

There, in my quiet moments, enveloped by the silence and blackest of night, I feel God's love wrapped tightly around me. It is not suffocating. Instead, it is enlivening. It reminds me of who I am and whose I am. It increases my trust in the Lord who has proven Himself over and over. The last part of that previous sentence is reminiscent of the chorus to the hymn *'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus*. You would think that I would begin to sing in such moments in worship and praise, or at the very least, such melodies would move through my heart and mind.

No, in those moments, I simply remain at repose in heart and mind and body. All aspects of my being are stilled and silent—no racing thoughts, no vacillating emotions, no muscles tightened to spring into action. There, in the dark, dark little void of my home, I simply stay in the Hand of God and feel His love and protection around me. When the moment is full, I am ready to utter my prayer: "Thank You, Lord for all that are and all that you given me. Thank You for family and friends. Thank You for protection and safekeeping, for watching over my family and guiding my steps."

Such composure and such a response are not my natural inclination. Recently, I read an article. In it, the author mentioned that in **I Corinthians 12**, Paul describes the body of Christ. That passage lacks imperatives which demand our action. Instead, it's a description of what we are and what we meant to simply *be* as the Church in the light of God's love. This is fitting as **I Corinthians 13** then relays to us what our love should look like when it is a sanctified and God-given love. Such love only flows from our being centered in God. It can only come from God and move through us. It bubbles up from our souls and flows into our lives from a spring imparted to us by the Holy Spirit [**Luke 6:45**].

All of that to say that God has been revealing Himself and His blessings to me in my darkest moments, sometimes in the actual moments of darkest night and more often in the



dark recesses of my mind, heart, and soul. In all those cases, He reveals Himself as good, gracious, gift-giver. It is then that I know I am blessed.

As your pastor, it is my prayer that you know yourself blessed as well. I want you to find yourself giving thanks this year not for what you have or by your circumstances. I want you to simply *be* in the presence of God and to still yourself before Him, so you may be enveloped by His loving mercy and grace. I want you to know the trust and faith anew, afresh, and deeper than you ever have before. I want you to experience a joy for being called into the body of Christ not in some vague, general sense, but I want you fall in love with the Bride of Christ in its particular form, in its present form, in its local form here at St. John's Evangelical Church.

Through everything I have endured this year, I have discovered a renewed love for this church, for service here, and for you. During this year, I have felt guilt for not being able to serve as I thought I ought to be. Then, I determined to return the gifts of love and service to you that you have expressed and done for me during my weakest moments. Now, I realize that such thinking was returning like for like, and as Jesus said, "Is that not what the Gentiles do?" [a poor paraphrasing of Matthew 5:43-**47**]. Instead, I hope my love for you comes from the wellspring of God's heart into which I have tapped after all my earthly striving has ceased. I hope it comes from a purer place. I pray that it more perfectly reflects His perfect love and fulfills Christ high and lofty command in Matthew 5:48: to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

I used to think such a being was impossible, but now I see it as a gift when we reside in God in perfect trust and faith. Then, thanksgiving, praise, worship, and love flow. May that gift be yours this season.



This is a reprise of one of my earliest articles and since there are so many attending that might not have seen or remember, here it is again. There is a wonderful book titled "The One Year Christian History" published by Tyndale. This book presents a daily devotional for each day based on a historical event in our faith. The following article is included on pages 632-33.

"The date was November 11, 1620, and the place was the Mayflower, anchored off the coast of Cape Cod. One hundred and two passengers including thirty-four children had spent seven weeks crossing the ocean from England. Of the passengers, sixteen men, eleven women and fourteen children were Pilgrims, having been associated with the Separatist church in Scrooby, England. Refusing to conform to the Church of England, they had first sought religious asylum in Leyden, Holland. After twelve years there, they became concerned that their children would no longer identify themselves as English. Learning of the possibility of settling in America, they made arrangements with the Virginia Company to settle just south of the Hudson River within the northernmost boundary of the Virginia Charter. However, fierce winds blew them off course to the north-to the shores of Cape Cod.

They decided to settle on Cape Cod *(because they were short on rations especially beer which was the only drinkable fluid)* but then realized that since they would not be under the jurisdiction of the Virginia Company, they would be on their own because they had no agreement with the New England Company. On board the ship some of the non-Pilgrim bonded servants and those hired by contract greeted this newly revised plan as an opportunity for rebellion. The Pilgrim leadership saw that they must act quickly to prevent a mutiny.

The Pilgrim men wrote up a compact, now know as the Mayflower Compact, and presented it to those on board. Forty-one of the sixty-five men signed it. Thirteen of those who didn't sign were sons of signers, covered by their fathers' commitments. The remaining men, nine servants and two hired sailors, were probably too sick to sign. The Compact read:

"In the name of God, Amen. We whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King James by the grace of God of Britain, France, Ireland, king, Defender of the Faith, etc.

Having undertaken, for the glory of God and the advancement of the Christian Faith and the honor of our King and country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation and furtherance of the ends aforesaid, and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions and offices form time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony. Unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names at Cape Cod, the 11th of November, in the year of the reign of our Sovereign King James of England ...Anno Domini 1620."

Before leaving the Netherlands, the Pilgrims had knelt on the dock to ask God's blessing on their voyage, and now William Bradford recorded, "Being thus arrived in a good harbor and brought safe to land, they fell upon their knees and blessed the God of heaven."

During their first winter, forty-seven people died including thirteen of the eighteen women. Only three families were left intact. These humble Christian men and women were to be the seeds of what would become the United States of America."

God obviously had a purpose for these brave souls and they had the conviction to stake their lives on it. Do we have the same faith and conviction to follow God's purpose for our lives?


