It is rather ironic, but the one constant of life is change. Change has come our way in rather seismic ways in recent years. Our culture has undergone great change. Our church is undergoing change. Change impacts our families and community at various levels.

Author Thomas Friedman writes of the rapid changes society has experienced:

If [a 1971] VW Beetle had undergone as many changes to its power and speed as has occurred to computer microchips, today that Beetle would be able to go about three hundred thousand miles per hour. It would get two million miles per gallon of gas, and it would cost four cents! Intel engineers also estimated that if automobile fuel efficiency improved at the same rate as [microchips], you could, roughly speaking, drive a car your whole life on one tank of gasoline.

There are a whole hosts of responses to change in our world. On one extreme, we can embrace change for change's sake. On the other, we can try to hide from it even when we know it will come and find us. In the Bible, we see both responses by God's people. Sometimes, Israelites

pursued other gods and other religious expressions than prescribed by the LORD in the hopes of changing their fortunes. Other times, they believed God's prophesied changes would never come to pass. In Ezekiel 12:27, we read: "Son of man, behold, they of the house of Israel say, "The vision that he sees is for many days from now, and he prophesies of times far off."""

Part of being faithful to be God is understanding our times and how the Holy Spirit is leading us to respond to them.

Are these VW Beetle times that need to be maintained and preserved, or are these microchip times when innovation and transition are to be embraced? Instead of an either/or answer, the response that is called for should more likely be a bit of both/and.

After all, God is immutable (the fifty-cent theological word for unchanging) as are His way and His Word. Still, we have been called to change to keep up with the times. As a church, we 'lost' our use of the German language to embrace our community and better engage with our wider culture. More recently, we have placed our worship online to continue to minister to members who cannot be with us in person.

As we begin our search for a new family minister/ associate pastor, we know there may not be an ideal candidate available. The role this individual takes in our midst will be shaped by their spiritual gifts, practical abilities, and willingness to step out in faith. Being part-time, there will be sensible limits on what they can accomplish.

> Even hiring someone will not necessarily solve all our needs. We will still need volunteers to support many roles within ministry. People will need to attend the programs offered if they are going to succeed. Our members will still be the best 'billboards' that we have-pointing others to our open doors and embracing those who enter this house of God.

At this time, St. John's Evangelical Church needs you to remain engaged. We cannot go back to the former days; they are in our past. However, we can maintain traditions that continue to feed the souls of our people. We can stay true to the foundational truths that have been handed down through the generations. We will maintain our focus on God's Word, the sacraments, and the

sharing of God's love with one another and with our wider community.

The means by which we do those things may change. We need to honestly assess how to minister to our wider community. We need to seek for ways that effectively share the Gospel and plant seeds of hope into the lives of others. Internally, we need to compel one another to grow in the faith. We have to be willing to ask how to disciple one another and urge one another to grow spiritually, so that we may be engaged in ministry and mission that impacts our surrounding world.


Change can seem daunting at times, but we also need to see it as an opportunity. Change one letter in the word change, and it becomes chance. Let that remind us that change is a chance—an opportunity—to grow and thrive in new ways.

Let me reiterate, we do

not want to change for change's sake. Just because our culture changes doesn't mean that those changes should impact our ethics or practice of the faith. However, as our culture changes, we have opportunities to share God's love with those impacted by those changes. With 'free love' and the breakdown of the family, we have the occasion to be an alternative where God's ethical boundaries allow individuals to truly flourish. We can demonstrate what it means to be the family of God. We can be a refuge from the tumult of a broken home. We can share love and grace that is not demanding or demeaning but pure and freely given.

Where we are the Church has been before. Throughout her long story, the Church has been forgotten and neglected. We see it in the Bible, and you can see it in history. There have been times when people have thought the Christian faith was obsolete or the Bible would be proven false or irrelevant. There have been times when people pursued worldly ways and left the church or tried to graft those worldly ways onto the Church's foundation.





Time and again, those false ways have fallen apart and blown away like chaff in the wind (see Luke 3:17; Psalm 1:4, 35:5, and 83:13). Over and over again,

God has left a holy remnant that stood firm in the midst of changing times. They held to the firm anchor (**Hebrews 6:19-20**) that is the hope of our faith, the eternal truths. At the same time, they were willing to try a new thing for God even when it seemed nigh

impossible. They did not run away from the challenges of change, but took the chance to engage as the Holy Spirit led

them to do. Such a way was the victorious path even though it was more arduous and narrow (Matthew 7:13-14).

In September and October, the preaching will focus on **Numbers 13-14**, where we see God calling the people of Israel to a great change, but the people rebelled against Moses and Aaron. We will see how Joshua and Caleb stood resolute in desiring to follow God's way. There is much in those two chapters that speak to our times. There are people following their own devices over and over again and failing over and over again. Then, there are those who stand in God's way and receive blessing even though it takes time, hard work, and diligence/vigilance.

The times they are a changing. That is as true today as it has ever been. But in these times, there are great opportunities to share God's love and to advance His kingdom. It takes attentive ears to hear and willing eyes to see. It also takes heart to compel our feet to go where God would have us to go and hands willing to embrace the work before us. May we be so willing.



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


Seeking part-time Family Minister/ Associate Pastor



- 1) Financial Report—Jerry Pfister
- This month we began the process of simplifying the understanding of the financial position of the Church. 5) Personnel Committee-Hal Elsasser-nothing to report

Pastoral Relations- Anna LaWarre—Anna will now schedule a meeting when Pastor is further along in his recovery. Membership on the committee is down to two and Kay will ask other members if they would be willing to serve.

7) Trustees (Jerry Pfister, LeVern Weaver, Greg Martin)

- HVAC update from Jerry: ATR is waiting on the replacement thermostats. When they arrive, they will be programmed to a tablet that has been donated. This system will control all of the main systems in the church. All Trustees, Richard, Denny and Kathy will be trained on it. It requires the use of a telephone number and that will be decided on by the user group. Kay will have access for fellowship hall functions.
- Painting update from Greg: C&Y has had problems with their bucket lift and are now talking about using a ladder to install the plexiglass. They are also bidding on restriping the parking lots.
- (A/V): Richard has acquired two microphones for use in the sanctuary which will eliminate the amplification problems we have encountered with the existing systems. He has also found a solution for the use of Microsoft systems by the church which significantly reduces the cost of our running that software. He will work with Jerry to attain as soon as possible.

- (Farm): Greg advised crops are growing and need rain.
