Last year, our Lenten journey focused on Christ and His Church. The theme was:

Lent: Who is this Jesus?

What Church do you want? What Church do you need?

I never planned for those questions to take root in such a powerful way in the spiritual lives of our

congregation. Those questions popped up in sermons throughout the rest of the year. People expressed to me that they found themselves asking those questions as they read their devotions, prayed, and read through the Bible.

During Holy Week, we gathered in the Fellowship Hall for dinner on Maundy

Thursday before commemorating the Institution of the Lord's Supper. Simple things took on even more profound meanings. A remembrance of God's deliverance (the Exodus) in the past had a very present fulfillment in Jesus' Death upon the Cross. Now and forever, that sacrifice has ongoing and lasting impacts on the lives of those who believe in Him.

And here we are in the midst of Lent again. It is a time to examine ourselves and our spiritual walk with God. It is a time to measure ourselves against the plumb line of God (Amos 7:7-9).

I am often surprised at how so many people in the faith and outside of it think of Christianity as what adherents cannot do. They fixate on rules, lists of sins, or the borders God places on His followers' lives. They hear the Ten Commandments read, and all they can hear is, "Thou shalt NOT..."

In doing so, people fail to hear what God is calling us to say, "Yes!" to. After all, in the scriptural passage where Jesus revealed Himself as the Great Shepherd, He proclaimed, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10b). God's desire—

the Father's heart—has always been to bless and love (study the Hebrew word *hesed*) His people and to give them shalom—overwhelming and overflowing peace and abundance.

The Holy Spirit inspired people to write the Holy Word of God not as a fence to enclose and imprison us from the outside world, but as the plumb line by which we could build flourishing and thriving lives.

Left to our own devices, we would be like children attempting to build a clubhouse with found scraps, no tools, and no understanding of building methods. The outcome would be laughable, ramshackle, and potentially dangerous.

With God's plan and provision, we are able to build something where we and others can gather together to receive shelter in the storm, to fellowship together, and to grow in faith. We are to build spiritually in a way that lasts. In **I Corinthians** 3:10-15, you can see how our works will be revealed as to whether we have built to have a lasting impact or not.

To truly have a lasting impact, we need to know more than what not to do. We need to take time to read and learn about how to build good and fruitful lives. More than that, we need to look at the Master Builder and emulate His work by building a life as He did (see **Hebrews 12:2; Psalm 127:1-2**).

While this Lenten question may not enter into our sermons as last year's did, I want us build on the lessons from last year. While we may not have a Maundy Thursday service where we gather for a meal before Holy Communion, I want you to seek for ways that you can share your life with others—those in your current social circle, those in this church, and those in this world that the beatitudes in Luke 6:17-26 and the following passage on loving our enemies—verses 27-36—call us to love. (After all, those scriptures in Luke will be the focal point for the Lenten sermons.)



This Lent, I want you to think about how God can use your life for His glory. What ordinary things can be transformed by His redeeming love? How can you use your time and talents to bless other people? It could be as simple as sharing a meal with someone else,

teaching someone how to sew a button, change their oil, or repair a cabinet door. It could be taking the time to hold someone's hand and pray with them.

Since my cancer diagnosis 07 February 2023, I have ruminated often on the scriptural passage concerning the foolishness of the Cross. I commend that passage to you this Lent—perhaps a good one for our prayer time at the altar on Good Friday. It can be found in I Corinthians 1:18-31.

This past year caused me to lay aside a lot of things, so I could run the race God has appointed for me (**Hebrews 12:1**). Even my lack of strength and stamina have become gifts to me. I have learned what it means in **I Corinthians 1:25b** when it says, "the weakness of God is stronger than men." As I have become more vulnerable, I have become more approachable to people in the community.

One day, as I was having breakfast at the Midway, a woman tapped me on the shoulder. She began to tell me about her cancer diagnosis and the treatments that were set before her. She told me about previous bouts with this disease. She asked me to pray for her. I was feeling tired and unwell. I was ready to say, "I will pray with you," when the Holy Spirit stopped me, and reminded me what a dear friend and mentor taught me, "Why do we say, I will pray for you when we have the opportunity to pray RIGHT NOW?"

I stood up a little unsteadily, embraced her, and told her I was going to pray for her. After I prayed, I held her a little closer, whispered, "God bless you," in her ear, and gave her a tender, fatherly kiss on the top of her head. Nobody really noticed amidst the busyness and clamor, but for the two of us, that was a sacred space. I did not have to don my priestly garb, have scripture tumble from my lips, or have sacred music blaring through organ pipes or guitar strings.

God shows up in surprising places if we let Him, if we walk with Him, and if we are trying to enact His Will with our lives. As you journey with God this Lent, seek for ways that you can crow about His presence to others. More than just being the Rooster Church of Kenton, we need to be a people who proclaim His presence in our midst on a daily basis.

Also, as you walk with the Lord this year, I want you to think about how we can invite people into deeper worship with the Lord. It may be by incorporating common things (like a meal) into our worship time as we did last Maundy Thursday. It could be about taking sacred things like our prayers and anointing tears into the world as I did for that woman in Midway.

Wherever we go and whatever we do, may it be because we are walking with God and following in His Way (see **John 14:6**). May this Lent draw us closer to Christ as the Holy Spirit fills us more and more, and may we bring glory to the Father as we share His blessings with those us around us in this world.

It seems that March this year is a political free-for-all here in Hardin County. No matter your affiliation or independence it is almost impossible to avoid being hounded for donations or bombarded with commentary. Our mail boxes are filled with negative attack ads and sometimes dubious claims about an opponent's bona fides. At times it is difficult to realize, but Christianity was the bedrock of our

Nation and way of life.

"Almost all the civil liberty now enjoyed in the world owes its origin to the principles of the Christian religion. Men began to understand their natural rights, as soon as the reformation from popery began to dawn in the sixteenth century; and civil liberty has been gradually advancing and improving, as genuine Christianity has prevailed. By the principles of the Christian religion, we are not to understand the decisions of ecclesiastical councils...No; the religion which has introduced civil liberty, is the religion of Christ and his apostles, which enjoins humility, piety and benevolence; which acknowledges in every person a brother, or a sister, and a citizen with equal rights. This is genuine Christianity, and to this we owe our free constitutions of government. " *Noah Webster*

"Among the thousands of documents and events that demonstrate America's Christian origin are the sixteen spiritual proclamations issued by Congress during the American Revolution. Following the pattern of fasting, praying, and offering of thanksgiving to God that was in use in the New England Colonies, Congress asked the American states to fast and pray in the spring and offer prayer and thanksgiving in the fall of the year. States were asked to invite their citizens to cease their labors and observe the day as proscribed by Congress. The first of the sixteen spiritual proclamations was issued in late spring on June 7, 1775 and was a fasting and prayer proclamation. The sixteenth and last spiritual proclamation to be issued by Congress on August 3, 1784 was a thanksgiving proclamation. By far, the most spiritual proclamations to be issued by Congress in any single month was March. In all, six Prayer and Fasting proclamations were issued by Congress in the month of March from 1776 to 1782. *Credit to Christian Heritage Fellowship*.

I think we all can agree with Webster and look for his definition of Christian behaviors during the current political storms.

St. John's Evangelical Church Church Council Minutes Thursday, January 11, 2023 6:00 PM

Call to Order - Anna LaWarre, President Opening Prayer—Pastor Randall Leadership Development - Pastor Randall Officer Reports

Secretary's Report - The December Secretary's report was approved as submitted.

REPORTS

- 1) Financial Report—Jerry Pfister/Kay Rush
- Jerry Pfister stated that we had a very good December and had positive cash flow for the month. He stated that although our envelope giving was down versus last year and plan, reductions in spending allowed us to come in below plan. Therefore, our loss in revenue to be made up by using farm income was \$16,282 less than planned.

Despite a downturn in market value during most of 2023, the markets rebounded sharply in November and December and our portfolio increased in value by over 10% versus last year. In viewing our investment portfolio, it should be noted that Endowment funds can be used only as specified by the donor. The Church may not use these funds for any other purposes.

- 2) Christian Education—No committee report
- 3) Women's Ministry—Kay Rush—No report due to illness
- 4) Worship, Arts & Music—LeVern Weaver
- Ash Wednesday services will be combined again this year with Payne Chapel. Pastor still awaiting details from Rev. Deborah. It was decided to hold a Maundy Thursday service, not have Good Friday service and a Sunrise service during the Easter season.
- 5) Personnel Committee—Hal Elsasser- nothing to report. Pastor indicated we have received no interest from our outreach for filling the Family Minister position. It seems to be a post covid situation where applicants for ministerial positions are in very short supply.
- 6) Pastoral Relations- Anna LaWarre—meeting in March
- 7) Trustees (LeVern Weaver, Greg Martin, Richard Katterjohn)
- AV Report Submitted-: Richard Katterjohn stated that there needs to be a review of charges for certain AV functions such as video for funerals. Now that his schedule is changing at the Times, he will recommend changes were needed
- Van: LeVern Weaver—no report
- Farm: Greg Martin met with Watkins regarding renewing farm lease . Jerry also talked about renewing hunting lease.
- Other Trustee issues: The handle on the attached storage area outside the church was broken in what was probably an attempt to break in. Greg has replaced this. Snow plowing will be done again by Temple this year and Greg will contact them to make sure it includes cleaning of the sidewalks. Due to the safety issues caused by freezing water, the North Entrance of the church will remain locked. The congregation will be notified to use the East or South entrances.
- 8) Missions, Evangelism -Anna stated that the calendar was in place for the 2024 events and it will be in the packet for the Congregational Meeting. Presentations for the individuals missions this year will be in advance of the month designated so everyone knows what they are donating for. This year the mitten tree at Christmas will be changed to benefit those serving in the armed forces. There has been a surplus of mittens and hats for children donated in the community for several years, so this change will be made without a negative impact to the children.
- 9) Pastor's Report Pastor Randall report submitted

Old Business: Discussed in Pastor's report in detail.

New Business:

- Current identified candidates for the three openings are:
 Hal Elsasser for 2nd term; Jerry Pfister for 2nd term; Janie Risen for 1st tern
- Election of Officers will occur after the Congregational Meeting on the 28th of January.
- Installation of officers will occur at a service in February as well as recognizing those going off Council.
- Richard will get copies of the existing trifold letter introducing St. John's to prospective attendees.
- Anna will work on a "get involved with a committee" letter to go to the congregation.

Correspondence: We received a thank you letter from the Gideon's noting that our contribution equated to almost 400 scriptural handouts.
