THE PASTOR'S PAGE

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SEIZE THE DAY!!! Many people of a certain age were introduced to that phrase while watching the movie **Dead Poet's Society** when Robin Williams character taught his class about *carpe diem*. The reason we use the Latin in this case is due to the fact that the first use of that phrase—that we know of—was by the Roman poet Horace. Since then, many poets have utilized the thought. In English, poets have put their distinctive stamp on the *carpe diem* motif, exhorting us to seize the day, to make the most of life, to 'gather ye rosebuds while ye may', in Robert Herrick's well-known phrase, or to 'Stop and consider! Life is but a day', as Keats has it in 'Sleep and Poetry.'

As for so many others, that phrase captured my attention in my youth. I felt like I had been sleepwalking through life. *Carpe diem* reminded me to wake up and do what I could with the days I had. It reminded me that life was short, and I may not have a tomorrow. Instead of procrastinating or waiting for a more perfect time, today was the day to

live life to its fullest.

Carpe diem crept back into my life this past year when I was confronted with the reality that the number of my tomorrows could be quite limited. It was a humbling and harrowing time.

Hopefully, I have not

depressed you too much by dwelling on that fact. My hope in sharing has always been to encourage you when you face life's challenges. When faced with tragedy and travail, our hope is to be found in God and God alone.

Even in my darkest moments, I found that my life was best lived in the light of God's love. I rediscovered my passion for preaching, teaching, and service to God in His Bride, the Church. I found joy in mundane acts. Simple little things became sacred acts when I thought about maybe doing them for the last time. Whether I was delving into deep theology or reading a comic strip to help me relax, I found that God could be in those details if I was doing it for

Him and the service of His people.

And that's the rub, we need to be living for Him and in Him and through Him. When our hearts and minds and souls are fully engaged with the Lord, we not only find our purpose, but we can simply be our true selves in the light of His love.

When facing your mortality, you can be driven inward in your thinking. Coming out on the other side can be a glorious relief. However, it can also come with great guilt. Even though I am still undergoing treatment, I have had to watch as others did not survive the past year. Many were younger and were just as 'worthy' of a healing as I was. Somehow, I survived and they did not. The prayers prayed for them were just as holy and pure as the ones lifted for me.

That's how I came to know carpe diem. In my teens and

early 20s, more than a handful of my contemporaries died. They never had the opportunities to be at our high school graduation, go on to school, start a career, or form a family. As I experienced those things, I could not always enjoy those moments fully. I suffered from survivors guilt. This year, I still do—only a bit more acutely.

Last year, as I led this congregation to Holy Week and Easter, I shared that I could not celebrate the Resurrection until I walked out of the hospital after my surgery in June. Easter for me was going to be delayed, but in some ways it still is. However that is foolishness.

Our lives don't follow some cookie cutter blueprint like the houses in a planned community in suburbia. We have a plan and a purpose for our lives but it was one that was uniquely given to us by our heavenly Father. We need to receive it and accept it, and we need to live it out in the freedom of His love.

Jesus understood this. There were moments when He said that His time had not come. Then, in **John 17:1** in the Upper Room, He proclaimed: "Father, the hour has come. Glorify Your Son, that Your Son may glorify You." This is the beginning of Jesus' Priestly Prayer as He was about to go to the Cross. He knew His suffering would be immense, and He would feel pain and desolation in every fiber of His being. He knew He

could only accomplish this work if He was obedient to His Father, and He was showing us how to live.

When our hour comes, we are not to shrink back, but we are to move forward knowing that we are propelled by God and His will for our lives. We need to seize the day when we can. As Jesus said in **John 9:4-5**, "As long as it is day, we must do the works of Him who sent Me. Night is coming, when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

And that is what the Easter season is all about. Easter Sunday this year was March 31st and Pentecost will arrive May 19th. In between those two dates is the season of Easter. It is a time to live in the light of the reality of the

Resurrection. We remember how Christ suffered and died for us in our place on the Cross. Even more, we remember how He rose again from the grave and ascended into heaven. Most of all, we remember that we will one day rise with Him to be with Him eternally

(I Thessalonians 4:16-18).

As with any great point, there is always a counterpoint. The same is true with the idea of *carpe diem*. Throughout history, it was enjoyed by many who were seeking pleasure and enjoyment. It came to be about engaging the present moment of today while neglecting the past and our need to live for the future. Robert Frost in his poem *Carpe Diem*

ST. JOHN'S EVANGELICAL CHURCH:

MAKING AND MATURING
DISCIPLES OF JESUS CHRIST

provides a wonderful counterpoint to seizing the day. (You can find the poem on page 4 of this newsletter.)

As Christians, we do need to seize the day—to hear Jesus' admonishing us to work while it is still day. Like Christ, that work is not about one's self. The work to which we are called in Christ is to be focused on others. For our church, our now this year is about working in the light to improve the lives of others in our community. We need a leader for our Wednesday Night Ministry—someone who wants to inspire our teachers, helpers, and kitchen staff. We need people who want to see people in recovery by meeting people from Celebrate Recovery and our Anonymous groups.

For all these people, we need to seize the day by walking alongside of them across the bridge of Christ as they travel from living in this world to living for the kingdom as they meet Him here in His Bride, the Church.



this summer.








Blanchard Place Nursing Home Ministry (First Tuesday)

Celebrate Recovery Meal Sign Up

St. John's supplies a meal for Celebrate Recovery twice a month. The meals is the second and Fourth Tuesday of each month for approximately 25-30 people. In our faith, we are surrounded by many symbols and symbolic acts. For example the Christ Candle which enters our sanctuary to represent His presence at our worship. At the end of the service, the congregation **should be following** the Christ candle out of the sanctuary to signify our willingness to follow Christ in our daily lives. Are you leaving early?

Another interesting Christian symbol is the fish. Elesha Coffman writes in Christianity Today:

"The Greek word for fish is "ichthys." As early as the first century, Christians made an acrostic from this word: Iesous Christos Theou Yios Soter, i.e. Jesus Christ, Son of God. Savior. The fish has plenty of other theological overtones as well, for Christ fed the 5,000 with 2 fishes and 5 loaves (a meal recapitulated in Christian love-feasts) and called his disciples "fishers of men." Water baptism, practiced by immersion in the early church, created a parallel between fish and converts. Second-century theologian Tertullian put it this way: "we, little fishes, after the image of our Ichthys, Jesus Christ, are born in the water." Greeks, Romans, and many other pagans used the fish symbol before Christians. Hence the fish, unlike, say, the cross, attracted little suspicion, making it a perfect secret symbol for persecuted believers. When threatened by Romans in the first centuries after Christ, Christians used the fish mark meeting places and tombs, or to distinguish friends from foes. According to one ancient story, when a Christian met a stranger in the road, the Christian sometimes drew one arc of the simple fish outline in the dirt. If the stranger drew the other arc, both believers knew they were in good company. Current bumper-sticker and business-card uses of the fish hearken back to this practice. No symbol means the same thing to all people at all times. That early Christians succeeded in transforming an already powerful symbol proves their interpretive creativity, not their ignorance or a tendency to syncretism."

I leave you with an ancient Christian Roman saying-"Pax vo biscum" Jerry Pfister, Historian
